ON THE CUSP OF THE EIGHTH DAY

Celebrating 9 years of Aravani Art Project

- Gallery XXL presents the first solo exhibition of the **Aravani Art Project**, collective led by transwomen and cis-women based in India
- The exhibition opens on Thursday, January 9, 2025 for Mumbai Gallery Weekend 2025
- The curation celebrates the **9 year anniversary** of the collective's work that has traversed through streets as well as studio spaces

Gallery XXL is thrilled and honored to announce ON THE CUSP OF THE EIGHTH DAY, the first solo exhibition of Aravani Art Project opening on January 9, 2025 during Mumbai Gallery Weekend.

ON THE CUSP OF THE EIGHTH DAY, summons the life and works of Aravanis, the transgender community in India, through the Aravani Art Project – a trans and cis women art collective. Celebrating the 9 years of the collective's art practice and praxis, the exhibition presents canvases, photographs, testimonies and narratives that work towards the bringing down of severe discrimination, social stigma and systemic inequality faced by the Transgender Community in India through the medium of art as its vehicle, voice, and tool to create a space for intersectional voices in the society.

The title of the exhibition finds its root in the story of Aravan's sacrifice, the central deity of Aravanis. This sacrifice, which is necessary for the victory of Pandavas in the 18 day war of Kuruskshetra in the epic of Mahabharata, becomes a pivotal point for the transgender community to commune together in the month of Chaitra (April/May), and celebrate the 18 day Koovagam festival. The festival holds a ceremonial marriage of Iravan to the people of the community and is followed by their widowhood after the ritual re-enactment of Iravan's heroic death on the eighth day of the war.

With this threshold on the eighth day of a war where a sacrifice is necessary for a new beginning, the curation puts forth different dualities at the stroke of midnight – binding the doubleness of how gender, gender identity, gender expression and sexuality is conceived, perceived and lived. Collapsing days and nights, individuals and communes, home and the world, cosmos and dreams that exist in the undergrounds and subcultures to crack open dreams and constellations that exist on streets, in homes, on mirrors and bodies, these dualities become guiding impulses for co-existence; ultimately provoking a fold in reflections, identities, and norms that entail the society.

In the confines of Gallery XXL, the Aravanis come with joy, resistance and pride to expand the meanings of desires into modes of survival, the meanings of belonging with respect to chosen families, the meanings of work vis-a-vis art, unabashed expressions, the body, and the meanings of art into praxis, culture work and living.

About Aravani Art Project

Aravani Art Project is an artist collective from India led by transwomen and cis women. The name of the collective is derived from Lord Aravan, the patron god who is a significant figure for transgender communities called Alis (also Aravani in Tamil, and Hijra throughout South Asia).

With a practice based primarily in public spaces, Aravani Art Project's mission is to bring visibility, challenge stigmatized ideals and subvert systematic discrimination perpetuated against transgender, gender non-conforming and queer individuals. The collaborative and participatory approach toward making art enables access for the community to congregate and create a space that celebrates intersectionality through visual art. It becomes a tool for expression, story telling and consciousness.

Using their work as a platform, Aravani Art Project encourages members to participate in the process of creativity and voice their opinions to be an active part of society. The visual stories that surface; of lived realities and freedom, become the voice for rights and empowerment to imagine a more colourful world.

The collective's work of integrating contemporary public art through activism in the urban fabric has awarded them grants and fellowships from India Foundation for the Arts, Khoj International Artists' Association, Museum of Art & Photography (MAP), India Art Fair, and the 60th Biennale Arte 2024 in Venice. Their oeuvre has embraced a multitude of collaborations with for-profit and non-profit entities. They have worked with brands such as No Border Shop, SoHo House, Microsoft, JP Morgan, Levis, Goldman Sachs, Araku, among others. And some of their institutional collaborations include IIM Bangalore, RMZ Foundation, RPG Foundation, India Art Fair and Sandbox Collective.

About Steevez

Steevez is a visual artist and curator based in Chennai. His photography emphasises social and environmental narratives, and has garnered international recognition. Steevez's educational background includes a B.Sc. in Visual Communication from Loyola College and advanced photography studies from the Pathshala South Asia Media Institute, Dhaka and Speos Photography Institute, Paris.

His work has been published extensively, with notable features in Mongabay, Cosmopolitan India, and a variety of national news outlets. Steevez has been an active participant in the global photographic community, curating significant exhibitions such as the World Refugee Day show at Loyola College and co-curated Nitham 2022, 2023 part of Vaanam, celebration of Dalit history month organised by Director Pa. Ranjith's Neelam cultural center. Through his camera lens and curatorial projects, Steevez continues to work in the landscape of contemporary photography.

Since 2017, Steevez has been working on an ongoing project with Aravani Art Project titled **Portraits of Home** presenting portraits of transwomen through the medium of photography.

About the Gallery

Established in 2023, Gallery XXL is an urban contemporary art gallery based in Mumbai, India.
